- Click the links at the top of the page for more information about the candidates and background of each race.
- The ballot measures links interpret what a "yes" and "no" vote mean for each ballot measure by county. This makes voting easy even with tricky language in some of these measures.

[VoteSmart](#) makes it easy to review candidates' biographies, issues positions, and voting histories, so you can be sure the candidates you vote for are aligned with the issues that matter to you!

EMORY'S VOTING POLICY

Emory strongly encourages all employees to exercise their right to vote. Emory's Voting Policy allows staff to take **up to 4 hours paid time** for the purpose of voting. These 4 hours can be used for early voting as well as Election Day voting. If you intend to use this paid time in order to vote, please let your manager know ahead of time.

HOW DO I FIND OUT WHERE TO VOTE?

Use the MVP Log In to check your

1. Voter registration status
2. Mail-In application and ballot status
3. Poll location
4. Early voting locations
5. Elected Officials
6. Registration information on file with the county office
7. Sample ballot for the upcoming election
8. Provisional Ballot status
9. Access to UOCAVA ballots

Note: My Voter Page provides a web-based search of data extracted from Georgia's statewide voter registration database. It is NOT the official record of your registration, which is retained by the voter registration office in the county of your residence.

- Use of cell phones is prohibited- bring paper notes if needed!
- You can vote as long as you are in line by the time polls close.

DIDN'T REGISTER TO VOTE IN TIME? REVIEW DEADLINES BEFORE THE NOVEMBER 8TH GENERAL ELECTION

- **Online registration deadline:** Fifth Monday before Election Day
- **Register by mail deadline:** Must be postmarked by the fifth Monday before Election Day
- **In person registration deadline:** Fifth Monday before Election Day

DID YOU KNOW?



In the United States, the 1965 Voting Rights Act is considered one of the most important pieces of civil rights legislation in United States history. Its purpose was to secure the voting rights of African Americans under the 15th Amendment.

In the United States 2016 election, six million citizens were not allowed to vote due to a felony conviction on their record, a statistic which affects in 1 in 13 African Americans.



Approximately 64% of the United States' voting-age population is registered to vote, compared to 91% in Canada and the United Kingdom, 96% in Sweden, and nearly 99% in Japan.



In the United States, individual states decide how and when to register voters, which has often led to confusion. Just 13 states allow voter registration on Election Day.

Over 22 countries around the world require their citizens to vote. Citizens who do not vote

are typically subject to penalties, such as fines or community service. Voter turnout in these countries is typically high.


